



Information sheet: Looking at the Bible with others from across the Anglican Communion

Writing about BILC Archbishop Justin Welby posed a number of questions about how we read the Bible, “Do we understand how others in the Communion, often because their context is different from our own, do this? Can their context and perspectives be a gift to mine? In exploring some of these questions – together – I am convinced that our appreciation of the Bible may be transformed and enriched.”
